#### PERENNIALS TO PLANT IN SEPTEMBER

Fall is not typically the season that comes to mind when we think about putting new plants in the ground. However, there are some gorgeous perennial plants that perform great when you plant them in September. It's a great time to plant fall flowering plants and many spring bloomers that flower on old wood.



Astilbe should go in the ground at least eight weeks before the first expected frost date with a hefty layer of mulch to give them time to establish roots. Bloom in summer with large plumes of highly

textural flowers. Full sun to full shade. Height 24"-36".

Anemones are members of the buttercup family. They have long stems and delicate attractive flowers. Bloom time varies according to species. The tall flower sprays stand high above the dark



green foliage, which has a purple tint. Full sun to partial shade. Height 3'-4'.



Helleborus, also known as Lenten roses, is the rose of the winter garden. Plant at least four or five weeks before the first expected frost date. A winter bloomer and an evergreen, their deep

green foliage will keep things looking alive in the cold weather. Full sun to full shade. Height 12".

There are many varieties of rudbeckia, all in warm shades. The 'Chocolate Orange' variety is fancier with a deep red center that fades to bright orange at the ends of the petals. Rudbeckia



greatly benefits from vernalization, which is an initial period of cool temperatures, to become established. Full sun. Height 24"-36".



Perennial tickseed is very cold tolerant. Plant them now to help them get established before winter. They will hold their foliage longer. The 'Moonbeam' variety forms a lush

mound of lemon-yellow flowers for most of the summer. Works well in beds and containers. Full sun. Height 1'-2'.

Helenium, also known as sneezeweed, is a great perennial to sow in the fall. Sprinkle seeds on moist soil two to three weeks before first frost. Another plant



that likes vernalization. The seeds need to experience some cold weather to germinate. 'Waltraut' has lovely brown eyes and brick-red petals tipped with the slightest bit of yellow. Full sun. Height 2'-4'.



Late September is perennial peony planting time. In warmer areas, planting can be done into November. Fall-planted peonies tend to have a stronger constitution. 'Pink Hawaiian Coral'

flowers heavily and has strong stems, perfect for cutting. Full sun to partial shade. Height 2'-3'.

September marks the end of iris planting season. These bulbs need some cold weather to grow. Planting them while the soil is still warm will help them to establish some roots before the cold sets in. Full sun. Height 2'-3'.





Chrysanthemums are perfect for fall planting. They can go in the ground as soon as the weather begins to cool, preferably while they're still blooming. Give them at least six weeks to establish

before winter. 'Clara Curtis' are large and daisy-like, with soft, pink ray petals and a cheerful, yellow eye. This variety also goes by the name 'Country Girl.' Water your mums at the soil level to avoid fungal issues on the foliage. Full sun. Height 18"-24".

Hostas make beautiful borders in partially shaded areas. Some tolerate full exposure, but the afternoon sun can burn the pretty leaves. The sweet spot for planting these perennials is while the



soil is warm, and the air begins to cool. Give them at least three weeks before the first freeze arrives. 'Fire and Ice' is a variegated hybrid and a smaller variety. Full sun to partial shade. Minimum height 8".



If you have six weeks to spare before the first freeze rolls in, you have time to plant coneflowers. They need this amount of time to establish roots, so they will return in the spring. These long

bloomers are great for the pollinator patch, and they make long-lasting cut flowers. 'Secret Affair' is no average coneflower. Its voluminous flower heads practically glow in neon pink. There is no keeping them a secret. Unlike the standard, single-petal form flowers common in nurseries, these are much showier. They have a large, rounded cluster of petals covering their spiky cone. Full sun. Height 1'-2.
